

"I was in my hotel at NAMM in L.A. and I saw the ad for the contest in Guitar World," recalls Matt O'Ree about what led to him to enter the Guitar Center's Guitarmageddon King of the Blues" contest. "I just kept thinking about how great it would be to win the whole thing. When I got home, I went up to the NYC store and signed up."

When the smoke cleared, Matt ended up in Chicago for the finals, being judged by the likes of Hubert Sumlin, Rick Nielson and John Mayer. And to top it off, just as he imagined back in L.A., he won the contest. Chris Duarte, Indigenous and Robby Kreiger. He has shared the stage with legendary drummer Buddy Miles and he was invited to play at Les Paul's birthday party. He performed at the NYC tribute to legendary blues-rock guitarist Rory Gallagher, and won a standing ovation from the sold out crowd.

Matt has a new CD out, to go along with two he released in prior years. His 1997 debut, 88 Miles, garnered him national reviews and airplay. His second album, 2001's Chalk It Up continued the momentum. His newest effort, the just-released



The trip to Chicago was a treat for Matt, in addition to winning the competition. "It was really awesome to be in that town, with so much history to the blues," he says. "To perform at the House Of Blues to a sold out audience was such a great honor, one of the best moments

of my life.

The future looks to include more travel, as well as upcoming shows at The Stone Pony and Six Flags/Great Adventure. "I'll be headed out to Austin, TX, to perform at the Summer NAMM show from July 13-16," he relates. "The new CD is doing great, getting great reviews and receiving more and more airplay. Just shopping it around for a label as we speak. We'll see what happens."

Matt keeps his spirits high through his music and constant performing, but he has been around long enough to realize what the life of a working musician is like. "The more time that goes on in the realm of a musician's life, the more you realize that the creators of Spinal Tap were right on the mark," he laughs. "There's never a dull moment, but rock stories have to stay on the road..

Of course, Matt is no stranger to fans of the Jersey music scene. He won the "Top Guitarist" and Top Blues Band" categories at the 2004 Asbury Music Awards. He has opened shows for Buddy Guy, Gov't Mule, Robin Trower, Johnny Winter, Dickey Betts, The Screamin' Cheetah Wheelies,

Shelf Life, is what he hopes will lift him to the next level. "This album is a step in another direction," he says. "When I started writing these songs, I wasn't sure what to think, it all just came out. It's a more rock direction than I've done in the past and I have to say, it really felt great to stretch out musically. I'm really proud of this CD. I think it really marks a step of where I'm going next." The album continues his collaboration with drummer Bob Pantella, who also mans the skins for local heavy rock luminaries Monster Magnet.
